In the last year, United Way's core educational partnership programs with local districts continued to expand in both capacity and curriculum, providing more students throughout the county with the tools and resources they needed to reach educational goals. 




in times of crisis.

United for Literacy



Supporting students in our community has always been an essential pillar in United Way's efforts to build a more resilient community. In partnership with local educators, school districts, and community organizations, United Way steps in to fill the achievement gap that many low-resource students and families experience

in reaching their educational goals and milestones. United Way creates safe and supportive learning spaces for students throughout the year through impactful community programming like Fun in the Sun, the United Learning Center, School-Based Programs, and Early Learning Success **Institutes**. Each of these programs incorporates individualized academic support, access to community services, and a dedicated network of community partners and educators to support families and students in building a stronger foundation for a brighter future.

School-Based Programs

In partnership with local school districts across the county, United Way supports over 25,000 students with web-based literacy programs and software. These programs, Lexia and Reading Plus, are both accessible 24/7 online and continue to be essential tools for educators and students. The need for supportive virtual and hybrid learning software continues to grow, as districts manage the residual effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on student progress. **47 schools** throughout the county utilize these programs to support the educational progress of students of all ages.





Fun in the Sun



In 2021, Fun in the Sun, United Way's national award-winning summer learning program, returned to an in-person program after a virtual program held in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The summer learning collaborative served 350 children and 250 parents at six locations in Carpinteria, Santa Barbara-Eastside,

Santa Barbara-Westside, Goleta, Solvang, and a brand-new Guadalupe site that launched to serve North County students. With the support of dedicated program staff, school districts, and United Way's extensive network of community partners and educators, students enjoyed a safe and enriching summer experience at all sites throughout the county. As the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic continue to ripple throughout the community, the need for the Fun in the Sun program is more intense than ever, bringing students together to overcome the challenges of extended isolation and distance learning with a focus on STEAM and literacy curriculum. To best support both the educational and emotional needs of participants, United Way expanded its focus on mindfulness and mental health in both education and enrichment activities with the addition of supplemental program components including:



- Yoga practice with local instructors and studios
- Social-emotional programs and support for students and families
- Partnership with Inner Warrior, a program that develops mindfulness, self-defense, and self-advocacy skills
- Expanded bicycling program in partnership with Santa Barbara
 Bike Coalition
- Engaging STEAM enrichment activities
- Partnerships with Explore Ecology and One Cool Earth to implement a gardening program at every site



In response to the intense need of participating students and their families, Fun in the Sun supplemented engaging educational and mindfulness curriculum with a comprehensive range of wraparound resources to support household health and stability. Partnering with organizations like the Assistance League, Hospice of Santa Barbara, and Family Service Agency, Fun in the Sun was able to provide over 600 community members with essentials like food and clothing, mental health counseling and education, and homelessness prevention services. Participating families struggling with rent and utility bills were also encouraged to apply for United Way's Emergency Rental Assistance Program and were connected to impactful community resources and organizations to support other basic needs.

United Learning Center



The United Learning Center, a tutoring center inside the United Way facility with

satellite classrooms at local schools and community centers, was created to address the needs of academically struggling students who had challenges accessing affordable, effective tutoring. The program's relaunch came at a critical time due to the pandemic's prolonged school closures. During the pilot phase in 2020, the program served Harding Elementary School's high-need first graders who missed much of their kindergarten year, a crucial learning period for young children. During the pilot, all participants gained an average of 2.3 reading grade levels. In 2021, the program continued expansion and now operates at three sites throughout the county. Over 150 local students have already been served at the United Learning Center.

Early Learning Success Institutes



To help address pandemic-related learning loss, United Way has coordinated with school districts to expand its kindergarten-readiness programming to address the needs of even more of the County's youngest students through the **Early Learning Success Institutes (ELSI)**. For the first time in the program's 20-year history, ELSI programming served approximately 300

students in grades K-2 in the summer of 2021 in school districts throughout the County. At each site, a certified teacher and instructional aide work with small groups of students to support basic skills (i.e., sharing, numbers, colors, letters, early literacy, etc.). Teaching is individualized to address each student's particular presenting needs. To help students maximize their progress, ELSI expanded its services this year and will operate in tandem with the United Learning Center, United Way's tutoring center. ELSI students participate in small group tutoring sessions with United Way instructors to work on personalized lesson plans. In addition, students will practice and develop social-emotional skills and mindfulness to better cope with lingering stress due to school closures.

- Help them to overcome their fear of being away from home
- Build important skills needed for successful early learning
- Develop early literacy skills
- Improve English skills
- Effectively engage parents and families in their child's education
- Connect families with community resources
- Overcome learning loss associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and virtual learning difficulties

United for Financial Empowerment



United Way leads a network of 13 nonprofit organizations, financial institutions, and 150 IRS -trained volunteers who are committed to helping Santa Barbara County's lower-income residents build long-term financial stability. The partnership provides financial literacy education, access to affordable financial services, and the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program.

Each year, the VITA program provides over 1,000 local households with free tax filing services. IRS-certified volunteers guide participating residents through the tax process, from collecting documentation to reviewing and filing both federal and state returns. United Way works closely with partners like the Housing Authority of the City of Santa Barbara to provide these services to the community. In 2021, 1,362 local households received over \$2 million in tax refunds. Many families established savings to cover emergencies, college, or retirement.

Crisis Response & Recovery



The devastating effects of the COVID-19 pandemic exposed an urgent need for services and local leadership in the distribution of aid for families throughout the County. As a result of an expanded focus in the field of crisis response, United Way was able to magnify its role as a community leader in recovery efforts. From the expansion of new programs

in rent relief, childcare, and innovative government partnerships, United Way leveraged a diverse network of partners and resources to quickly adapt to the changing needs of residents. In collaboration with local individuals, organizations, disaster response officials, the County of Santa Barbara and other municipalities, United Way has raised or managed over **\$51.3 million** to support households in need since the start of the

pandemic. United Way remains committed to identifying emerging challenges, establishing dedicated networks of resources and leaders, and investing in new collaborative strategies that directly support families, organizations, and school districts in need.

Adapting Existing Programs

Substantial adaptations of our core programs were implemented to continue serving our communities effectively in the new and challenging COVID-19 environment.

Critical Needs Fund

When the pandemic first struck, United Way joined with the County Public Health Department and the James S. Bower Foundation to create the Critical Needs Fund— a collaborative partnership that enabled government and philanthropic leaders to connect regularly and explore strategies to partner and invest in response to urgent needs.

Partnership Success Stories



When we first met Julian (Kindergartener) at the United Learning Center (ULC), he was struggling with his ABCs and was shy about learning. He was often frustrated with himself and was quick to give up on difficult skills. ULC tutors were worried about his benchmarks, as he was far behind his grade-level peers and even fell behind some of some students in lower grade levels.

From day one at the ULC, tutors worked closely with Julian to provide one-on-one attention and care. His educator team brainstormed new ideas to make learning engaging and less intimidating. Within the first few weeks, staff started seeing positive changes. With the individualized support, his ABCs and literacy skills began

to improve, and more importantly, leaders also saw increased enthusiasm and confidence for learning. After a couple of months, Julian reported his favorite part of his day at the ULC was "Homework Time" and during a Thanksgiving activity, he told tutors that he was grateful for "Homework, School, and his Backpack!" At the conclusion of the semester, Julian measured in line with grade-level literacy goals and gained confidence in the classroom, engaging with peers and tutors.



Max struggled on his first day of Fun in the Sun. He was crying and refused to go into his classroom, struggling with being away from home for the first time. Max's mother explained to me that Max had a tough time with virtual learning and an even harder time making friends. He was terrified of being around other kids and questioned if the other kids would like him. For the first week of the program, Max's mother would stand outside the gate and watch Max as he cried for her and sat by himself away from the other kids. The Fun in the Sun staff worked together to make sure Max felt welcomed, engaged, and encouraged to find his place in the group at his own pace. Max's mother expressed her gratitude

to the Fun in the Sun staff for their patience and kindness. By week three of the program, Max's mother couldn't believe the changes she saw in her son. Max loved the program and talked all the time about his new friends. What Max's mother was even more grateful for was the opportunity to practice his math and reading. Since Max struggled with distance learning, she knew he was behind in his academics. At the end of the program, Max's mother thanked the Fun in the Sun staff for providing such a wonderful and unique experience for her son.

"One of our TK children Elijah who had just turned 5 enrolled in my tutoring session. He was awarded the Harding Hawks award for most improved and knowing all his letter sounds. I am very proud of him. He is a great learner! I was thanked by his teacher and his dad for all his improvement. I thanked them all with a big smile."

While it helped them with the skills of riding bikes, it also helped them with their confidence, which is so vital during this time.
